The People Who Set Hundreds of Fires

Serial arsonists are among the most mysterious criminals there are. No matter their motive, they have the power to induce terror in multitudes. They generally have few social ties, living the majority of their lives in solitude, only interacting with others when it is necessary.

These people can be found anywhere, but tend to be the most destructive in arid regions, such as California, where hundreds of thousands of acres have burned. The motives for firesetting can range from monetary gain to excitement and attention, and even to pathological tendencies, which is the case in an impulse control disorder known as pyromania.

True pyromaniacs are extremely rare, and most arsonists set fires for money, or perhaps revenge. Corey Roush, a freshman student, as well as a junior firefighter and aspiring arson investigator, said, "It would be for money, it is more for a personal gain."

The most prolific serial arsonist in history is John Leonard Orr, also known as the 'Pillow Pyro', a former captain and arson investigator for the Glendale Fire Department in California. He is believed by some to be suffering from a form of pyromania which compelled him to set fires in order to relieve anxiety. In total, it is

believed Orr set over 2,000 fires in his lifetime. The most notorious fire he set was at the Ole's Home Center in South Pasadena, which killed four people, including a child.

Orr is currently serving a life sentence for arson and mass murder, and there has been previous debate about giving him the death sentence. Hope Wilson, a junior, said if there was a serial arsonist like Orr in Logan, she would "be completely scared and just hide in my basement."

There is likely some debate regarding whether pyromaniacs should be imprisoned or given mental health treatment. Mrs. Gordon said, "Probably help first, unless their activities have led to death or lots of destruction."

Not much is known about pyromania, and it remains shrouded in mystery to this day. Due to how rare it is, along with many other impulse-control disorders, such as kleptomania or intermittent explosive disorder, not many studies have been conducted to obtain information about it.

However, many theories exist as to why the act of firesetting brings such elation and satisfaction to some people. Some believe it may come from a primitive human attraction to fire, others suppose it is because of the attention it brings. The Austrian neurologist Sigmund Freud even thought it comes from a desire to gain power over nature.

Super Bowl 36 in 2002, which they lost to the New England Patriots 20-17.

The last time the Rams won a Super Bowl their current head coach, Sean McVay was only 14 years old.

The Rams won their first and only Super Bowl on January 30th, 2000 in Super Bowl 34 against the Tennessee Titans.

Conspiracy Corner: The Disappearance of Amelia Earhart

Amelia Earhart was a famous pilot of the early 1900s. Earhart was known for her resourcefulness and knowledge as a pilot. While on one of her many missions, Earhart's plane had disappeared off the radar. The events of what happened after losing Earhart and her copilot on the radar, their condition, and their location is still unknown.

In 1928, Earhart was the first woman to cross the Atlantic accompanied by two other pilots.

On May 20-21, Earhart flew solo from Newfoundland to Ireland. The flight lasted 15 hours, making her the second person to ever fly this distance.

On August 24, 1932, Earhart flew from Los Angeles to Newark, setting the record for the longest distance flown without refueling. Earhart is the first female pilot to complete a "nonstop transcontinental flight."

In 1937, Earhart planned to fly across the globe making 20 stops along the way. The flight would be 29,000 miles which would last her to an estimated forty days. If she had completed this she would have been the first successful woman to fly around the world. On this flight, Earhart flew in a twin engine Lockheed Electra. This plane could carry up to one thousand pounds of fuel at max. Her journey began in Oakland, California also accompanied by Fred Noonan.

On July 2, 1937, Earhart and Noonan were prepared to leave their current location of Lae, New Guinea. Before the plane had left the gas was maxed out in the plane, carrying one thousand pounds of fuel. Their trip had only 7,000 miles left. Before leaving, Earhart

has planned to stop at Howland Island, which would be an 18 hour flight.

Radio operator Harry Balfour had scheduled radio transmissions with Earhart every hour to check on how the flight would be going. They had noticed that before the flight the headwinds, wind blowing toward the plane, were strong that day. The headwinds can affect the speed of the plane, how much gas is consumed, and how long the flight would be. Because of the headwinds, Balfour sent Earhart transmissions three times in two hours, none of which that Earhart received. At 2:18, Earhart has received the transmissions. About an

hour later, they received delayed transmissions from Earhart saying that that the plane had rose 10,000 feet, it is still a mystery why.

Once Earhart had come close to her destination, the Itasca boat were to have provided her with communication and weather updates. Unfortunately, in her transmissions she reported that she could not see and her gas was running low.

At 8:43 AM, the boat received a transmission saying, "We are on the line 157, 337. We will repeat this message. We will repeat this on 6210 kilocycles. Wait." That is the last message from Amelia Earhart. In the transmission, it is said that her voice sounded "frantic."

After the message, Earhart, Noonan, and the plane were said to have disappeared. To this day, many still wonder what happened to Earhart and her co-pilot.

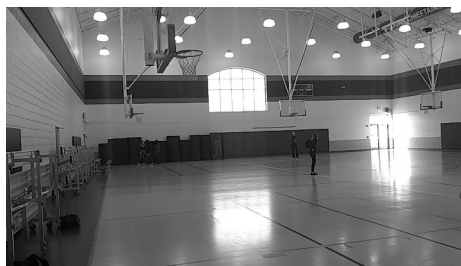

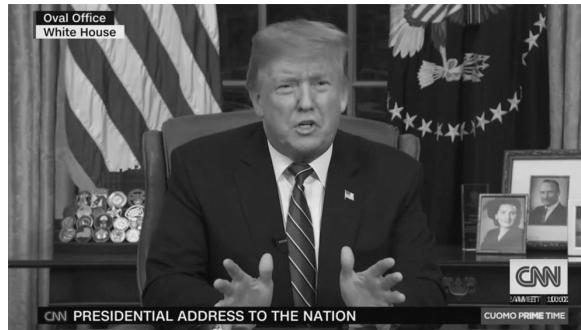

How to do Scripted Set Pieces Well

A few weeks ago, I was home playing a game called The Call of Cthulhu. At a certain point in the game, I got in a specific story point with an actually enjoyable scripted sequence. A scripted sequence is a point in a video game where the game puts you down a linear path for the sake of a story. These are usually not designed well in my mind, however, some have been done well. So how can you do it well?

Let's start with the most common, but in my opinion, the worst form of scripted sequence: cutscenes. A cutscene is a movie that plays in a game. The problem with them is that they can be overused. Action heavy cutscenes are the worst because, as Dan from Extra Credits puts it, "They only invoke in the player the sense of wanting to do rather than just see." Personally, they should only be used for quieter moments in a story where gameplay won't cut it.

Scripted sequences can also be done through gameplay. A great example is the beginning of Far Cry 5. The beginning of the game had some good tension and taught you the main mechanics. Some games try to add new mechanics. A good example is a mission where you use a glove to jump through two different time points with different enemies in the game Titanfall 2: this adds variety while adding a new challenge.

They can be done poorly too. The best example is forced stealth sections in action games and vice versa. They can also work when staying within your main

mechanics. The problem is you need to have some challenge, as the YouTuber Turbo Button said, "if the stakes are fakes there's no thrill on the grill."

The final method is telling stories through a games systems. To elaborate on this, more games can use various systems that interact with each other. These can help create stories unique to the player. These types of games are the best for storytelling. This way, players can create their own solutions to the problem. As Mark Brown put it, "Making levels for systemic games is more about giving the player a goal, and not caring how they achieve it."

Is there a right way to tell a story in a game? No, no there is not. It depends on what you are trying to do in your game and it's story. In my opinion, a game is most enjoyable by using systems to make interesting scenarios, but a linear story focused game, like the Uncharted games, might not be able to. It all depends on what your game needs.

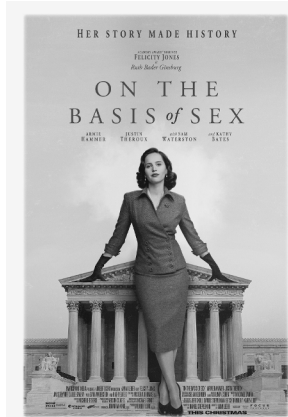

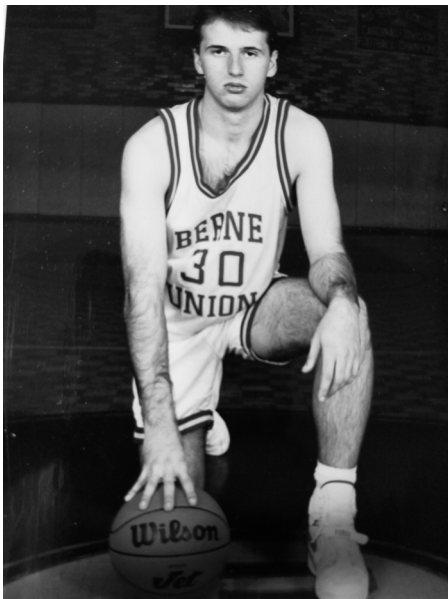
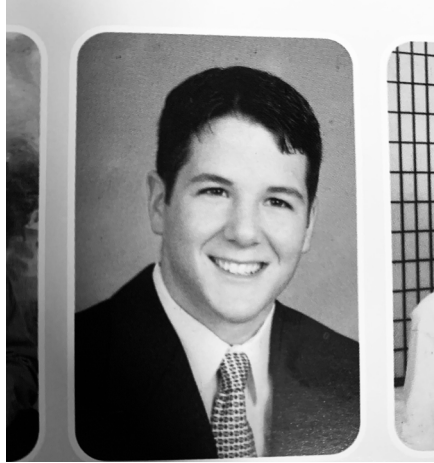
This is what most of the scrunchies look like.

\$15,000 Missing of Items Found

On December 31st, the Circleville Police Department uncovered between 10 and 15 thousand dollars worth of missing items in a house at 150 Fairview Blvd in Circleville, Ohio. Surprisingly they found the missing items through a social media post. Officers found pictures of the stolen items when looking through reported pictures these items included: three guns, power washers, snowblowers, a leaf blower, weed eaters, a wood chipper, and a go-kart among other random power tools.

A comparison of McDonald's style in the 1960s to today's.



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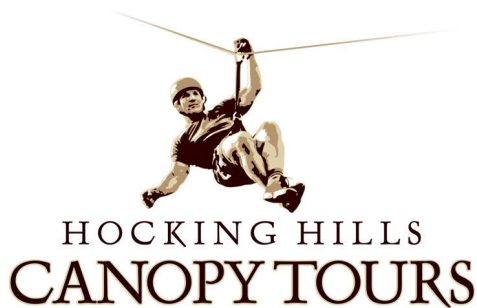
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
